May 25, 2020

2019 was a productive year for the organization, as the Board and the organization has been able to shift primary focus away from organizational structure and become more outward-looking.



Expanded support for the annual conference from Executive Director Michelle MacDonald and her team has rapidly become indispensable. The 2019 conference in St. John's, NL, proved to be a great success, due to both the support and the unrelenting efforts of the local NLAPP conference committee.

API's role at the national level remains strong. Relations and inter-PTIA procedures continue to be strengthened at the Standards Committee (SC), Planning Standards Board (PSB), and Planning Alliance Forum (PAF) tables, as well as with the Joint Administrators Group (JAG). Tracey Wade represented the board at the annual face-to-face PAF meeting and the meeting of the SC signatory parties in Ottawa in July of 2019.

2019 also saw the launch of the new API website and expanding branding, all in an effort to maintain a strong presence on behalf of the profession.

In preparation for 2020, the Board approved the launch of a strategic planning process for the organization, which began with a survey of members and outreach among the provincial associations.

As we move into a new year, we look forward to continued efforts on behalf of our member organizations.

Executive Director's Report



May 25, 2020

With August 2020 fast-approaching, AOR Solutions can say it has been almost four years since we were brought on to provide association management services to the Atlantic Planners Institute (API), and I became the part-time Executive Director. It continues to be my great pleasure to serve as Executive Director. I, and other members of the AOR team, provide the equivalent of 85 hours a month in support in a variety of ways to the Atlantic Planners Institute (API), including executive leadership, administration, bookkeeping, membership coordination and communications.

Key initiatives in 2019 included renewing the governance model, strategic planning and the creation of atlanticplanners.org. API continues to provide registrar support services to the four provincial associations. As the 2018 API Conference was such a success, API has continued offering administrative, registration, graphic design and communications support to the conference organizing committee. Coordination efforts were also made with Dalhousie School of Planning to include students in the Conference activities.

As Executive Director, I have also been liaising with the Canadian Institute of Planners, the Professional Standards Board, the Professional Standards Committee, the Planning Alliance Forum and the provincial Institutes (known as PTIAs) across the country. I also am a member of the Joint Administrative Group, which is an informal working group of the PTIA Executive Directors.

The AOR Solutions team and I continue to be proud to provide association management services to the Atlantic Planners Institute and the four provincial associations. We look forward to continuing to work together with members to support and expand the planning profession in Atlantic Canada.

Treasurer's Report

May 25, 2020

Once again, I am pleased to report that 2019 was a successful year financially for Atlantic Planners Institute (API). API's Management team at AOR Solutions has provided exemplary service and has been successful at developing and streamlining processes that have contributed to the financial stability of the organization.



2019 Financial Statements

API's 2019 revenue was approximately \$81,625 and expenditures were \$78,235 for a difference of \$3390. The profit margin was larger than expected, as a result of a very successful API conference cohosted by the Newfoundland and Labrador Association of Professional Planners. As a result of the conference profit, the Board determined that an additional \$5000 could be directed to begin the API governance review and strategic planning in 2019 (which was originally planned for in the 2020 fiscal year). In 2019, API had a year-end financial position of \$103,771 in net assets which included nearly \$79,400 in cash and equivalents and almost \$38,840 in investments.

Reserve Funds

2019 saw the establishment of Capital Reserve funds as part of API's ongoing work towards becoming a fiscally responsible organization. As such, the following amounts have been identified as internally reserved:

- Operating reserve: \$35,000 this represents 50% of the cost of administration and would give the organization 6 months to transition in the unlikely event of API closing its doors.
- Discipline reserve: \$45,000 this is a minimal amount that has been set aside to assist with possible litigation in relation to disciplinary measures against members.
- Strategic reserve: \$15,000 this amount is earmarked for strategic contingencies as opportunities arise to improve the organization.
- Conference reserve: \$10,000 this amount is set aside to cover the unlikely event that a conference experiences financial losses.

Revenue Generation

With API's new website, new revenue-generating services such as job postings are now being offered. API continues to look at new ways to provide excellent and economical service to its four member associations as well as to the broader membership of individual professional planners in Atlantic Canada.

2020 Budget

In planning for the 2020 budget, the Board approved a cost of living increase at 1.7% (which equates to \$4) in membership fees, for a total of \$236 for a full member. Each Provincial association may charge separate fees – the baseline being \$30 per member going back to each provincial association.

API membership fees remain consistent with membership fees for many of the other Provincial and Territorial Institutes and Associations (PTIAs) of similar size.
